DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

Annual Report and Welcome Remarks Professor (Dr.) Bimal N. Patel Director, Gujarat National Law University

It is my honour and pleasure to welcome Shri Ravi Shankar Prasad, Hon'ble Minister of Law and Justice of India, Shri Pinaki Chandra Ghose, Hon'ble Judge Supreme Court of India and Visitor of the University, Shri R. Subhash Reddy, Hon'ble Chief Justice of Gujarat High Court, Shri Pradeepsinh Jadeja, Hon'ble Minister of Law, Gujarat, members of the General Council, Executive Council, Academic Council and Finance Committee of the University, members of the judiciary, bar, academic and research institutions, media, proud students and even more proud parents of graduating batches of 2011-16 UG batch, LLM 2015-16 Batch, Ph.D. scholars, my faculty and administrative colleagues, GNLU students and dear guests.

The University infrastructure and programs built brick by brick, day-by-day, proudly presents its achievements of 2016. GNLU continued strengthening its academic, research, extension and training programmes and activities in 2016. National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) accredited GNLU with 'A' Grade. The year marked half-term of our Mid-Term Plan 2014-19. A team of senior and junior faculty and staff members have initiated process of assessing the performance of our mid-term plan.

Diversification of Teaching Programs and Interdisciplinary Approaches drove our academic mission in 2016. As you know, GNLU remains the only National Law University which offers 5 integrated undergraduate law program, most importantly Bachelor of Science and Law and Bachelor of Social Work and Law. While the University continued to offer five under-graduate interdisciplinary courses at LLB and 4 specialisations at Post-Graduate level, it introduced several online and residential certificate and diploma programmes in collaboration with its alumni, partner institutions from India and abroad. It also initiated MBA in Financial Management and Business Laws and resolved to launch MA in Criminology and MA in Public Policy, Law and Governance from 2017-18 Academic Year. The University witnessed significant growth in interest to pursue studies, research and training under our BSW, LLB and B.Sc., LLB programmes.

Research: GNLU has carved out its niche and has initiated pioneering inter-disciplinary research projects. GNLU faculty authored and edited 8 books, presented and published 48 research papers in national and international conferences and 30 faculty of GNLU were invited as visiting faculty member and resource persons from universities in India and

abroad. GNLU, as part of its Research-based Teaching University mission, has in place Student Research Interest Groups which comprises of 371 students in as many as 64 subjects. These students actively collaborate with faculty in bringing out research and publications. Involvement of 35% students in research activities itself is a matter of deep scholarly satisfaction.

Leading publication houses of the world and India, including Oxford University Press, Routledge, Brill / Nijhoff, LexisNexis, EBC have brought out GNLU publications. Research and Publications Department has now a dedicated cadre of Research Faculty at Professor, Associate Professor and Assistant Professor level. The Research Council prepared guidelines to further boost research and publications including dedicated research funds for high quality inter-disciplinary / multi-disciplinary research. Each of our research centres has well-defined plan of action and set of achievements every year.

Friends, in addition to undertaking individual research, collective research has emerged as a distinct trend in the GNLU. Our first collective research resulted in Law, Economics and Society – Prospects and Challenges publication, the second one – Interdisciplinary Approaches to Sustainable Development. We are deeply grateful to Shri Narendra Modi, Hon'ble Prime Minister, despite his heavy schedule, for having graced the book with his message. The research book is published by the Oxford University Press.

Public-Private Partnership Significantly Augmented: Our research mission is recognized by government departments, public and private institutions, firms, corporate houses, navratna PSUs of the nation and abroad. ONGC, Microsoft India, Gujarat Urja Vikas Nigam Limited, Gujarat Council on Science and Technology, Gujarat Maritime Board, Khaitan & Co., Ministry of Earth Sciences of Government of India, Satluj Vidyut Nigam Limited, Cube Construction Engineering Limited have established research chairs. In this regard, I am extremely pleased to announce today that Shri Navinchandra Desai Law Foundation has established GNLU-Navinchandra Desai Law Foundation Chair under which the Chair will fund research papers, provide assistance towards Gujarat Law Journal, the only such type of Journal in the whole country, provide assistance towards students to practice in Gujarat High Court or Trial Court and pursue internship at United Nations and other organisations. I thank Shri Prashant Desai, Shri Pranav Desai and everyone associated with the Trust for making most generous contribution in establishing the Chair. We assure our esteemed donors that GNLU will fully live up to their expectations in creating centre of excellence in all legal and interdisciplinary fields and preparing best legal professionals for the service of the nation and the humanity.

Friends, importance of ethics and values remains utmost critical in any profession. Availability of best laws, specialisation and competence, fluency in languages, oratory skills, experience, all may be but useless if these are not founded on strong pillars of core ethics and values. At GNLU, we care the most about the ethics and values and our efforts are boosted, as I speak, by none other than the top law firm of the nation – Cyril Amarchand Mangaldas & Co by establishing a dedicated chair on Legal and Judicial Ethics and Values. Me and my faculty consider this as a path-breaking and trend-setting initiative. We sincerely thank Shri Cyril Shroff and his team for the Chair and hope that we individually and collectively will live up to the expectations of the Chair as we continue to grow. I am equally glad to inform you that our pioneering initiative – GNLU Litigation Assistance and Support Scheme received donation from leading senior advocates Shri K. K. Venugopal and Shri P. P. Rao. I take this opportunity to appeal lawyers and family members in this hall to help us further in augmenting our resources. Under GLASS, GNLU provides stipend to graduates for a period of one year, thus,

ensuring that bright law graduates opt litigation as career instead of just focusing on corporate law practice. We are grateful to donors of various gold medals, numbering 24, for their gold medals to encourage students to bring out best in academic and extra-curricular activities.

Law Department: Law Department of Gujarat, from inception to today, has remained a single most important source of support to the University- be it finance (which is the most important), regulatory support, interaction with other departments and institutions of the government, internship and placement. Between 2009 and 2016, GNLU organized and/or hosted 21 research activities, 11 training and extension programs and 12 academic-research activities for various departments of Gujarat. Our public-private partnership brings mutual benefits to department of water resources, tourism, department of science and technology, biotechnology directorate, education, environment and forests, social justice and empowerment, biodiversity board and various public-sector undertakings of Gujarat. Recognising our aims and achievements and true to the spirit of the State and its leadership, the Law Department has allocated grant of INR 2 crore for research, extension and training programs and to promote legal incubation. On behalf of us all, I thank Shri Pradeepsinh Jadeja, Hon'ble Law Minister and his team of Law Officers led by Shri Ilesh Vora, Law Secretary and the entire department and through them to the Government of Gujarat for their continuous support. Sir, I am sure the University, faculty, staff and students alike will remain the valued ambassadors of this state in India and abroad. We look forward to your continuous patronage of this world class law institution and hope to keep the state proud with the highest standards of legal education.

Dissemination of Knowledge and Enhancing Internal Capacity: To gain the knowledge, deliberate on the existing knowledge and new frontiers and disseminate the same for the benefit of students, faculty and legal community at large, the University Centres, faculty and the University as a whole, organised / hosted 78 training programs, certificate courses, workshops, guest and special lectures. Our programmes enriched by 264 resource persons from India and various nations benefited nearly 5905 participants from India and various corners of the Globe.

Students' Achievements: GNLU has some of the outstanding achievements in moot in 2016, winners of the India Rounds of 57th Philip Jessup International Law Moot, winners of Asia-Pacific Rounds of the 14th ELSA Moot Court, Runners up at Asia-Pacific Rounds of Manfred Lachs Space Law Moot, Best Team in the Asia-Pacific Region at Nelson Mandela Human Rights Moot Court, Semi Finalists at Louis Brown Moot Court among others. GNLU has introduced Investment and Securities Law Moot which is keeping in touch with major reformation taking place in the country in investment and securities laws and regulations. Our Model United Nations gives platform to aspirant diplomats and negotiators for honing their skills. Our Debating Society provides opportunity to aspiring future law-makers and parliamentarians to learn the nuances of the parliamentary debates. While these extra-curricular activities consolidate intellectual knowledge, skills and abilities among students, our sports tournaments and internal matches aim to keep students healthy and fit and sporty in their attitude towards life and profession. Similarly, daily yoga and prayer sessions enrich our spiritual quotient too.

GNLU continues to achieve 80% placement of registered students within one year of their graduation and 100% internship record for all registered students. Students are showing inclination towards diverse fields of legal and interdisciplinary profession. Although law firms and corporate houses remain the top preferences, there is steady growth in GNLU students opting for judicial services, public services, think-tanks, government departments and public sector undertakings. With insolvency and bankruptcy code, now the reality

and financial resolution and deposit insurance code on the verge to become reality, I am sure GNLU students would orient themselves to work in these fields. GNLU allocated ₹ 2 crore scholarships and financial assistance to student-driven activities such as GNLU Internal Committees – Academic Support Programme, Competitive Examination Guidance, debates, moots, cultural and sports activities.

GNLU Legal History Museum has become a reality. It hosted two exhibitions – Judicial History of the Indian Cities and the Holocaust – the Courage to Remember. The Legal History Museum has drawn appreciation from international and national legal and judicial institutions and authorities. We are grateful to various agencies who lend travelling exhibitions for display at GNLU. One important part of our museum is that we are able to showcase our rich civilizational legal history to children of various ages coming from villages and cities alike. I invite you to visit the travelling exhibitions before you leave the campus today.

Human Resources: Excellent institutions are built and run by faculty and GNLU is not an exception. With 42 full-time faculty and 15 research chairs and associates, the University is able to cater to the needs of students and external stakeholders. The core mission of faculty is supported by our dedicated administrative and technical staff. 50% GNLU faculty have PhD and more than 10 years of teaching and research experience. In terms of gender balance too, GNLU has neat record of maintaining almost close to 50% female and male faculty. In terms of diversification, 70% faculty are drawn from outside Gujarat. I am pleased to note that the General Council decided to implement Permanent Appointment Policy which would ensure that the University will be able to retain talented and committed human resources in its drive for excellence.

GNLU has adopted pro-bono legal services regulation under which each student of the University is mandated to provide legal services to needy and community institutions and individuals. As part of Swachh Bharat Mission, each employee of the University from Director to Driver is required to contribute 8 hours manpower in cleaning of nearby village Koba and heritage site. Clean Room Award, every month, one student in each of the floors is presented with Clean Room Award, thus we try to ensure the culture of cleanliness and I am sure the spick-and-span campus which you see today is due to the collective efforts of us all. When initiatives are kept voluntary, they remain on papers but when they are properly institutionalized, involvement of everyone is ensured and one can see visible changes.

You would have noticed installation of stalls, stages, colourful decorations across the campus. It is our annual cultural event – confluence of various cultures, dance, music, dramas and various cultural competitions. It is the Pentagram. GNLU students get fully involved in organization of various curricular, extra-curricular and sports activities, they give platform to talents not only of their own students but universities across the nation. They supplement University assistance with their fund-raising strategies and campaigns. Their commitment, hard-work and above all ethics and values have earned them distinct reputation. I feel proud to lead the GNLU family and grateful to God for giving us strength and wisdom to contribute in creation of iconic educational campus with the most generous help of Gujarat Government.

The vision to have a world class law university in Gujarat, nurtured by Shri Narendra Modi, Hon'ble Prime Minister of India (then Chief Minister of Gujarat), being realised, is bringing remarkable tangible developments in legal education and research landscape of the state and the nation through GNLU.

Convocation Address

Shri Ravi Shankar Prasad Hon'ble Minister of Law and Justice, Government of India

Distinguished visitor of the GNLU, Justice Pinaki Chandra Ghosh, Dr. Bimal N. Patel, the Director, Gujarat National Law University, the distinguished Chief Justice of Gujarat High Court Justice Subhas Reddy, my good friend from our youth wing days of the party, the distinguished Law Minister of Gujarat Shri Pradeepsinh Jadeja, distinguished Judges, Lawyers, Advocates, my esteemed friend and eminent lawyer of India Mr. A.K. Ganguli, young friends, what a pleasure to see you.

Your excitement, your hope but what struck me most was, I have been attending so many Convocations as the Law Minister of India, but what has struck me here was Mr. Patel Said that 50% are boy students and 50% are girl students but 99% gold medals are being won by girl students. I am really very proud of you. The PM who was a great motivator of this Institution and many of us in the cabinet of this government have been great supporters of gender justice. And Justice Ghosh I have a very interesting comment to make, if this is the beginning, after few years the collegium will be full of lady judges and so will be the Supreme Court. Mr. Ganguli better take a note, and speaking personally I am also a great supporter of large number of women not only becoming lawyers, teachers, going into Corporate Law but also becoming eminent judges. Well friends, today is a great day for you. Why is it a great day that amidst all the training that you have received by all the teachers and the way I am seeing expansion of Law in various sectors, it is truly a unique day. Now you are going to see the reality of life and why this great movement of National Law Universities is extraordinary, it is giving a new depth to the legal profession. When I see some observations of eminent office bearers of the Bar Council, of how many fake lawyers in this country, When I see some observations the sparkle of hope on your faces I feel very assured for the future of Legal profession in the country. I see the larger role of the national law movement and over the years I have been watching the growth of this national law movement. Earlier I was also on Governing Board of NLU Bhopal, Hon'ble Chief Justice then had nominated me so I am very happy with this growth. I don't want to give any pontification or Updesh to you but I would like to share some of my own experiences and how you can reflect upon that.

The first thing I want to tell you is today while India is 70 years as a free nation, please reflect upon the great role which lawyers of India have played in the freedom movement of this

country. Some semblance of their contribution. I would ask all of you to go to the life History of Sardar Patel. Not only was he a great leader. India is today what it is because of what Sardar Patel did for the country. But do you know he came from very humble background? He worked his way in the district court, then he thought I will first go to become a barrister but he ensured his elder brother goes first and then he earned good money to go to London and became a barrister and came back, did well in Ahmedabad as a lawyer and then became a top leader of the country. Mr. Ghosh comes from Calcutta High Court. It is one of my great passions to know the background of great lawyers. C.R. Das, you must know if you have not heard about him. He was a great lawyer of Calcutta High Court. In the year, 1923, he left his law practice to devote full time for public life for freedom movement. I understand I was given to inform that his monthly earning was 75000 rupees. In 1923 75000 rupees, how much it comes to now I leave it to your calculation. Every young law graduate of Calcutta University wanted to become his junior and a preliminary screening was done by a law clerk. He used to give young law graduate a brief and say "Sahab ke live note banao" and then C.R. Das used to sit in the evening and go through those notes and one who has done well would be called for an interview by him to study in his chamber. One day young lanky boy came and I was informed by some of the friends in Calcutta that he was given a 500 page brief of a first appeal "Sahab ke live note banao" and he made a 15 line note for C.R. Das on fact and law both and then he was turned out. What is this? 500 page brief and 15 line note. After 2-3 days C.R. Das saw that note and thought "Who is the young man who made this note?" "I have turned him down". "Now call him. He has stated the essence of the case both fact and law in the note." The young law graduate was Rajendra Prasad who later went on to become the President of India. You know him and I am very proud of this extraordinary performance. Today why am I recalling all of this? Because they are your heritage. They have made what law profession is today.

The second thing my young friends I would like to flag today is while I have been an activist all my life, why is it that only lawyers. became activists in the freedom movement at district level, state level and the national level. At that point in time other professions had come that well. Universities were there but the middle class hadn't grown and my take is when a poor farmer used to come to a district court and he saw his lawyer telling in English the judge "Your Honour! That is not the law, the law is this" he had to have a sense of vindication that today my lawyer has told an English Judge to his face that he doesn't know the law and a sense of nationalism used to come from there. He used to return to his village with a great sense of hope, faith in his lawyer and then lawyers became natural leaders. Today when India is 70 years mature, democracy is, as an open and intellectually empowered society I would request you not to remain completely insulated from the great heritage which lawyers of India have played in making what our country is today. Now what profession you will choose or go for is your call. Whether you become a teacher or go to a law firm but if you seek my unsolicited advice, become a lawyer. There is great fascination in litigation. There is great respect in litigation and with your talent, ability and potential if you go to litigation in many ways you enrich the standard of litigation and quality of argument. That is what I expect from all of you. Why I am telling you is that, litigation is a tough call, litigation is hard work. Its hard work everywhere. Litigation is also a struggle but if you struggle in the beginning, who knows you may become a top lawyer. There is only bounty and rewards with no retirement. That is legal profession I would like to tell you. Mr. Ghosh I would like to tell you a very interesting example. You become friends in the University, political circle in the academic circle, we four became friends at the Patna High Court. All of us began our law practice together. Some were senior one year, some of us were junior one year. These were the periods of struggle and they could not get the time to argue in the Court so we used to argue amongst ourselves in the lunch break when we used to have our tea at the tea

stall outside the High Court. But those were great days and friends one of them became a good lawyer, a judge of Patna High Court, Chief Justice of Rajasthan High Court and is now a Supreme Court Judge, Justice Naveen Sinha. The second became a good lawyer, a Judge of Patna High Court and is now the Chief Justice of Kerala High Court, Justice Namiti Prasad Singh. The third, Ajay Tripathi is a senior Judge of Patna High Court and the fourth, Ravi Shankar Prasad is the Law minister of India. Surely, this can happen to you too, why not? I see a lot of future judges and law minister among the young friends sitting here. Go ahead!

What is my third request to all of you? Not only do hard work but I am very happy Mr. Patel you have an ethics committee and proper promotion of ethical values research in that. You know ethical quality if they are important component of your personality, you command a different respect. I remember when my senior was teaching me in my initial days. He told me one thing, "You must command that trust from the bench, that if you say that it is stated in para. 60 at page 51 the judge must trust your word that what you are saying is factually right. But to have that trust, you must make ethical quality and integrity component of your personality and therefore, legal profession demands a lot of ethical qualities". I regret to say I see compromises somewhere which I do not appreciate. Therefore I would like to compliment Mr. Patel and his entire team that ethical values is now being articulated as a great component of your whole training and research programme and my suggestion with some experience to all of you is make that a great part of your persona. Friends, I can tell you, our profession is very demanding and challenging. If you slip at one point you may shine immediately but you will lose in the long term. That is how I see it and the choice is yours. I am sure with the great quality of head and heart, which you get here will surely impelyou to be more focused on the ethical values as well. You know that the PM has been kind enough to make me the Law and Justice Minister of India. But what is exciting me more is the IT Minister of India. India is at the cusp of a big digital revolution and some of the transformative programmes which we have started under the able guidance of the PM is digital India, Make in India, Start-Up India, Stand-Up India, Skill India are all designed to make India an empowered society. It is not a question of technology simpliciter my friends, I will come to the legal aspect of it subsequently but it is a case of empowerment. May I ask a question to my young friends: How many of you are on Facebook? Please raise your hands......Good! Let the IT Minister clap for you. How many of you are on twitter? Good! Mr. Patel you have given good liberty to your friends. Good! Keep it up. I am happy. But why are you little reluctant in raising your hand? Come-on! You are on Facebook......be bold! That is the India we want to create. If you tweet, be bold about it. You know what is the digital profile of India, my friends? In a population of 1.25 billion, India is home to 1.08 billion mobile phones. In a population of 1.25 billion, India is home to 1.12 billion Aadhar. Verifiable digital identity kept under safe and secured locations, duly backed by Parliamentary Law with full regard to privacy. Even I cannot give my own data with my own consent, lest l invite prosecution it can only go for stated objectives. 50 crore internet landlines and wireless, 35 crore smartphones and what is a smartphone? A smartphone is a moving computer. Indian digital economy is going to become a one trillion US dollar economy in the coming 5-7 years. Communication to IT services to digital delivery to E-commerce to cyber security to digital payment, all this is also going to create new avenues for legal redress. Let me give you one example. We opened 27 crores Jan Dhan account for the poors. We linked that to Aadhar, ceded to the mobile phone, and started delivering services of subsidies for the poor and under-privileged directly to their bank accounts. Do you know we saved Rs. 50,000 crores which used to be pocketed by fictitious claimants or middle-men.Beti paida hui nahi, vidhwa bhi ho gai aur vidhwa pension bhi milta tha. That was what was happening in the country. Digital governance is good governance. Digital delivery is faster delivery but this will throw up legal challenges also. The issue of data security, the issue of

privacy, the issue of competition. Why? Digital world is a virtual world and the problems of virtual world has to be addressed in the real world. That is the challenge you have to face. Take the case of Competition Law. Uber comes with a new innovation, the traditional taxi drivers are raising issues. Should technology create a monopoly, a position of dominance and if that is the scenario, what is the legal redress? These are some of the challenges which digital economy will throw and will require not only technological innovation, but also legal innovation and there I see an enormous opportunity awaiting for you to tap. In the field of intellectual property, competition, data privacy and the whole range of other innovative laws and Indians love technology. They enjoy technology and once this whole digital profile grows more, becomes an important part of India's commercial and economic discourse. Surely I see larger avenues opening for you.

I don't wish to make my speech longer. I know you are almost waiting to enjoy this moment with your parents, family members who have come to compliment you. I have to make only one last request: go conquer this world with all the talent you have acquired in this institution. But keep a heart for the poor and under-privileged and I really say so with a great degree of passion for you. The poor cannot give you fees but he will give you blessings and that will give enormous strength to your moral fiber. Make help to the poor and under privileged as a part of your persona and I seek your indulgence to give a personal example of mine. I had just started my law practice. It was 1983 and I was an activist in my initial days. I read in one newspaper that a Mohammedin Miyan was in jail for 49 years. A short news came. I filled a petition in the Patna High Court enclosing "Please intervene and give him some relief". Justice Ghosh you wouldn't believe, these were initial years of PIL, what a big dressing down I received from the judge. "You young people don't know court procedure, bought a newspaper, whether the news is correct and all". I kept on arguing and received a lot of bashing from the bench. Ultimately a compromise was worked out. If the news is found to be incorrect, I will suffer the consequences. But this came in the newspaper so one day a man from Assam came to meet me. Asked me "Are you Ravi Shankar Prasad?" I said yes. He said "My father passed away in the year 1949, and he said one of his brother is lost. Please do something for him. He used to work in Assam and in summers he used to come looking for his brother. Then the DM said go to this young lawyer, he has filed this case". Then he said his uncle was detained under an allegation of a murder case and there was mental problem with him and you know in law if you have a mental problem your trial is stayed and then the world lost track of him. He was arrested in the year 1927. Then I got permission from the bench asking to meet him. Then I met him and got him released and also got him a princely compensation of ₹ 25,000. Friends why I shared this experience of mine with you? Allow me a personal note more. Destiny has been kind to me. I became a well-known lawyer at the Patna High Court, was designated a Senior Advocate at a very young age. I did some of the very path breaking cases such as the Fodder scam, etc. and became a PIL activist which led to a big transformation. Many Chief Ministers and IAS officers went to jail. I also became a little known in the Supreme Court as a senior lawyer...not like Mr. A.K. Ganguli because I was very busy politically also. I was a Minister in the Vajpayee Government. I am a Minister in the Modi Government, Parliament member for the last 17-18 years. Destiny has been kind to me and I am thankful to the GOD and friends and all of you. But friends, in spite of all these modest success in my life, the faint smile of hope on the face of Mohammedin Miyan when he came to meet me after getting released after 49 years remains the biggest trophy of my life. That is how I see it and I would request you to cherish those moments if you will allow me to share my experience. Therefore, you have been fortunate to study at this Institution. You have been diligent to get a degree from here. You have been talented to get a gold medal from here but in spite of all these achievements and I know this is just the beginning, and you

are going to get a lot of these when you go back in life but always keep a heart for the poor and under privileged. Pro Bono is important and if you do that, surely you will get a smile on your face.
